

#### December Plate Shop Update By Jessie Ball, Operations Manager

From June 1st until November 30th, CSI printed over 2 million license plates. Over the next 11 months, we will print close to another 1 million plates for the reissue.

I want to make sure some people get the recognition they deserve. I would like to give a huge shout-out to Dave Williams and Alan Wessel for covering the majority of the plate shop over time. Dave has come in at 0500 most days for the last 3 weeks, along with almost every Saturday and Sunday. He has pushed this shop to achieve success and challenged them to get better each day. Alan has stayed late most nights and come in almost every Saturday since we started working overtime months ago. Bruce Sejkora has also dedicated a lot of time to cover the plate shop when the sign shop is not working overtime. He put in many late nights and weekends. At one point I had to tell Bruce to take a day off so he wouldn't get burned out. Traci Gates stepped up and picked up a lot of Sunday shop coverage or printer coverage when there wasn't anyone else. This was instrumental in keeping the shop running and falling further behind. Andrew Wehrman and Deidre Boyle also stepped up and put in a few weekend days for overtime, both also learned how to run the printers and weren't afraid to get a little ink on their clothing. These last couple of weeks Greg Cudaback stepped up and came in at 0500 with Dave to open the shop, help bag, and cover the shop when needed.

Traci, Bruce, and Alan also took on the challenge of learning the Prism software that was implemented when we got our new printers. This was helpful so that on the weekends we could continue to crank out plates, without the weekend printing we would have been behind. Pat Stull was instrumental in getting all of the designs completed and ready to be printed. There are a few new designs for the 2023 series you will start to see, some of these Pat created completely based off instructions from the DMV. This was not an easy task to undertake.

Nate Wolfgang and Matt Zier were rockstars when it came to handling all of the pallets of plates the shop would ship over daily. They kept on top of all of the shipments and worked with Ann and the drivers to get all of the plates delivered by today. To those that help with delivery, thank you very much! At the end of the day, every county had license plates in their county to start issuing on December 1st. That is a success. It didn't always seem like we would get there, but we did.
